MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

Proud to Serve the Residents of Alcoa

WE hope you enjoy this year's annual report and find it both informative and transparent. I would like to take this opportunity to provide important context regarding our city's reported crime rate and what it truly means for our community.

In this report, you will see that our city's reported crime rate is listed as 8,079 per 100,000 residents. At first glance, that number may appear high. However, it is critical to understand how this figure is calculated. The rate is based solely on our residential population of 14,270 people. What it does not account for is the tens of thousands of individuals who pass through our city every single day.

Alcoa serves as a major transportation and commercial hub. A primary highway and interstate run directly through our city. We are the only access point to a metropolitan airport serving approximately 3.5 million passengers annually. Within just 15 square miles, we host a high concentration of hotels, employment centers, and retail businesses. On any given day, an estimated 60,000 to 80,000 people are present in our city—shopping, working, traveling, and visiting. Every crime involving these visitors is included in our reported statistics and calculated against our residential population. Fair or not, this dynamic significantly inflates the reported crime rate. When examined more closely, the data tells a more reassuring story.



Violent crimes—such as murder, aggravated assault, robbery, and rape—remain moderate and are most often committed by residents who know their victims. Notably, there were zero murders reported last year. That is an achievement our community can take pride in.

The higher volume reflected in overall crime numbers is largely driven by property-related offenses such as vandalism, theft, shoplifting, and fraud. These incidents are frequently connected to non-residents passing through our commercial corridors. Additionally, the elevated number of drug-related offenses reflects proactive policing efforts. Many of these cases result from officer-initiated enforcement; without this proactive approach, they would not otherwise be discovered.

When crime data is adjusted to reflect our true daily functional population rather than only our residential base, the rate drops significantly. This provides a more accurate picture—our residents are not living in a high-crime environment.

The takeaway is clear: our city appears busy because it is busy. As a transportation, commercial, and retail center shaped by our geographic location, we naturally experience a higher volume of reported incidents. However, this does not equate to unsafe neighborhoods or streets for our citizens.

We are proud to serve the residents of Alcoa and deeply appreciate the active role our community members take in reporting crime and partnering with us. It is through this shared responsibility and continued collaboration that we keep our city safe.

Accreditation

The Accreditation Unit is responsible for ensuring the department is in compliance with the standards and best practices established by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA).

The Alcoa Police Department was first awarded International Accreditation from CALEA on November 18, 2006. Since then, the department has been reviewed each year and successfully received reaccreditation in 2009, 2012, 2015, 2019, and 2023. The next reaccreditation will take place in November 2026.

The Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) began in 1979 to improve the delivery of law enforcement services by offering a body of standards, developed by law enforcement practitioners, covering a wide range of up-to date law enforcement standards as an attempt to raise professionalism in law enforcement. The accreditation program is a voluntary program administered by CALEA.

ALCOA, TN

Population Estimate in 2024 was 14,270

Our city's reported crime rate is cited as **8,079 per 100,000 residents** – and this number may appear high at first. But this statistic only considers our 14,270 residents and **doesn't account for the tens of thousands of people passing through the city every day.**

Our city sits on a major highway and interstate. It has the highest concentration of hotels in the county. It provides the only access to a regional airport serving about 3.5 million passengers per year. On any given day, between 60,000 and 80,000 people are in the city working, traveling, shopping, or staying overnight.

When crimes happen involving travelers, commuters, hotel guests, or people passing through, those offenses are still counted against our residents. That makes the crime rate appear much higher than it would in a rural town with the same population but no airport, no interstate, and no daily traffic flow.

Crime is being calculated using 14,270 residents, but the actual number of people present daily may be 4–6 times higher.

Adjusting for the city's daily functional population, the crime rate drops significantly, showing that our residents are not living in a high-crime environment. The takeaway is clear: our city looks busy – because it is, and yes, crime is reported – but much of what inflates the statistics comes from our role as a transportation, commercial, and retail hub as a direct result of our geographical location, not unsafe streets for our residents.

Crime in Tennessee 2025

(*) Offenses are counted using the FBI Units of Count for Crime (**) The 'Arrests' column shows arrests made for incidents during the selected period, regardless of arrest date. Arrest counts for the same period may change over time.

The higher reported crime numbers are mostly related to vandalisms, theft, shoplifting, fraud, and drug offenses — and these are largely tied to non-residents.

A high rate does not automatically mean high violent crime — it may reflect a lot of property crime, drug arrests which usually correlates to proactive policing effort.

The absolute great news is there were zero murders in Alcoa last year.

When we break it down, violent crimes — murder, aggravated assault, robbery, rape — are mostly committed by residents and these remain moderate.

Under the National Incident-Based Reporting System, “Group A” includes a very wide range of offenses, not just violent crimes. It covers:

TRAINING

In 2025, the Alcoa Police Department hired five new employees for sworn positions. As part of the department’s standardized onboarding process, each officer received initial training on Bias Policing and biased enforcement practices. The initial training provided an overview of constitutional requirements, departmental expectations for impartial decision-making, and examples of prohibited conduct under both CALEA Standard and TN statutory requirements.

Throughout 2025, all employees, sworn and non-sworn, completed required annual training addressing Bias-Based Policing and related subject areas.

The combination of initial orientation, annual refresher training, and ongoing legal education supports a culture of continuous improvement and reinforces the department’s commitment to fair, impartial, and lawful policing.

Officer Scott Huston Takes the Lead as APD's New K9 Trainer

When Officer Scott Huston joined the Alcoa Police Department in August 2024, he brought more than 25 years of law enforcement experience—and a long-standing passion for police canine operations. APD is proud to announce his appointment as the department's new K9 Trainer.

Officer Huston began his career in 1997 with the Wasilla Police Department in Alaska, where he established the agency's first K9 program, and later served as a handler, trainer, supervisor. He also completed Northwestern University's Police Staff and Command School and earned a Master's Degree in Public Administration.

After joining APD, Huston was selected as the department's K9 handler following Lt. Moore's promotion. He and K9 Unar are now certified and serving on night shift while he also leads training for the APD K9 Unit.

Field Training Officer Johnston was selected for the specialized assignment of K9 Handler. In January 2025, he attended and successfully completed K9 Handler School at Shallow Creek K9 in Sharpsville, PA, earning his certification in this highly specialized role.

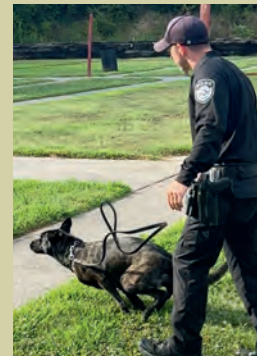


K9 Ozzy received a bullet and stab protective vest thanks to a charitable donation from non-profit organization Vested Interest in K9s, Inc.

K9 Ozzy's vest is embroidered with the sentiment "In memory of K9 Iza, Alcoa, TN - EOW 12/30/23". Vested Interest in K9s, Inc., established in 2009, is a 501(c)(3) charity whose mission is to provide bullet and stab protective vests and other assistance to dogs of law enforcement and related agencies throughout the United States. This potentially lifesaving body armor for four-legged K9 officers is U.S. made, custom fitted, and National Institute of Justice (NIJ) certified. Since its inception, Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. has provided over 5,970 vests valued at \$6.9 million to K9s in all 50 states made possible by both private and corporate donations. The program is open to U.S. dogs at least 20 months old and actively employed and certified with law enforcement or related agencies. K9s with expired vests are also eligible to participate. There are an estimated 30,000 law enforcement K9s throughout the United States. Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. accepts tax-deductible contributions in any amount, while a single donation of \$1,050 will sponsor one vest. K9 Unar, K9 Ozzy, and K9 Aline are dual-purpose canines trained and certified in various patrol dog functions such as tracking/trailing, building search, area search, article/evidence search, apprehension, and handler protection.

The third possible category of a K9 deployment is for Demonstration/Public Relations events. These usually show canine's narcotic detection capabilities as well as patrol dog uses.

Of the total 292 K9 deployments for 2025:

- 234 or 80.1% were narcotics-related,
- 52 or 17.8% were patrol related, and
- 6 or 2.1% were demonstrations or public relations related.

Youth Academy

- The youth academy is available to Alcoa High School Juniors and Seniors, providing an immersive experience in law enforcement.
- Students learn about the history of the Alcoa Police Department (APD) and participate in activities such as investigating a mock crime scene and processing evidence.
- Participants practice shooting various weapons, including pistols, shotguns, rifles, Tasers, and Bola Wrap at the firing range.
- The curriculum includes navigating unexpected scenarios to prepare students for real-life situations.
- At the program's conclusion, students receive a certificate of attendance, fostering a deeper understanding and appreciation for law enforcement roles.
- The program aims to inspire interest in law enforcement careers, particularly among those from the Alcoa community, with the hope of hiring future officers who are committed to enhancing the local area.
